

WASHINGTON, REGARDING THE SPOKANE AQUIFER JOINT BOARD


BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF MILLWOOD,

Board; and

parties in the protection of the Spokane Aquifer and
associated water rights as contemplated by the provisions,
terms and conditions of the attached agreement document, now
therefore,

that the Mayor and the Maintenance Supervisor of the Town of
Millwood are hereby authorized and directed to execute an
agreement for the purpose mentioned above, a copy of which

a part hereof.



THE SPOKANE AQUIFER JOINT BOARD
Local Water Utilities United for Safe Drinking Water

We are twenty-two water purveyors throughout the Spokane Valley and the City of Spokane dedicated to providing safe, clean drinking water to your homes, offices and industries, every day. Collectively we operate 122 wells, supplying drinking water to more than 300,000 customers in the Spokane area. This water comes from the Rathdrum Prairie – Spokane Aquifer.

BENEATH YOUR FEET is our **SOLE DRINKING WATER SOURCE**, the Aquifer, which lies between 20 to 600 feet below the earth's surface. There is no protective layer between surface activities and the gravelly 'sponge' which our water passes through. This means that our water supply is particularly vulnerable to contaminants that we use at home, in our schools and offices, at businesses and manufacturing facilities, if they are not disposed of properly.

We have four areas of emphasis to increase citizen awareness and cooperation in protecting this replaceable resource. However, individual efforts are the key to maintaining safe, clean drinking water.

EDUCATION and AWARENESS – This subcommittee is tasked with developing and implementing a long-term awareness campaign targeted at citizens living and working over our drinking water supply, the Rathdrum Prairie – Spokane Aquifer.

HOUSEHOLD CONTAMINANT DISPOSAL – provides assistance to residents with pickup and disposal of contaminants by augmenting the current collection efforts of the Spokane Regional Solid Waste System. Dispose of ALL household materials properly and for **FREE** by using one of three Waste Transfer Stations that accepts them. **Call the Recycling Hotline for more information at 747-0242.**

In North Idaho, for the Ramsey Road Transfer Station, call: **Kootenai Co. Solid Waste Department**

PRO-ACTIVE BUSINESS ASSISTANCE – provides assistance and information (not enforcement) to small businesses for contaminant disposal methods and procedures. If your business generates less than 200 pounds of dangerous waste or 2.2 pounds of acute hazardous waste per month, call: **Spokane Solid Waste Management @ 625-7898**

If your business generates more than 200 pounds of dangerous waste or more than 2.2 pounds of acute hazardous waste per month, call: the **Washington State Dept. of Ecology @ 456-2926**

POTENTIAL CONTAMINANT SOURCE INVENTORY – development & maintenance of a regional potential contaminant source inventory database. Under current Washington State regulations for wellhead protection, every two years water purveyors are required to notify potential contaminant sources (businesses) that are located within defined wellhead protection areas. This is a reminder of the business location over the Aquifer, and the need to protect it.

Let it assist you this spring in our second annual aquifer protection event, where you are encouraged to safely dispose of household contaminants at no charge. By doing this, you **directly contribute to protection of your drinking water.**

(Your District Name here) is a member of the Spokane Aquifer Joint Board, a group of 22 water purveyors in the Spokane Area who are dedicated to supplying safe, clean drinking water. This water is drawn from the **Rathdrum Prairie-Spokane Aquifer**, by way of a well that is close to your home.

Please take the time to look throughout your house, gather up all the unused and unwanted household cleaners, paints, solvents, automotive and landscape products, and bring them to one of the three convenient Waste Transfer Stations detailed on the guide. **There is no charge for disposal of household hazardous materials.**

You can bring your household contaminants to one of the Transfer Stations any time during the year at no charge. However, during the month of April, if you require assistance, please feel free to call the number on the Guide and **schedule a pickup by a trained volunteer.**
